I've seen areas where each home group has a door greeter that hugs each person that comes in the door, usually a Newcomer. Also, in Joplin, it's sometimes easy to hide out in a meeting that doesn't go around the room. If your format is popcorn sharing meaning whoever wants to share shares many times there are people that don't say anything. They can come around for weeks and months and nobody ever really gets to know them . It took me a little while here in Sprinafield to get used to that method of sharing in the meetings where we go around in each person either has to pass or say something, but it puts that person in the driver seat. You guys already do a good job at having functions and getting the people to fellowship. Do any of your groups still go out for coffee or something to eat after the meetings? That's always a good way to make people feel comfortable. Do you guys still do pizza at area? That's the only reason I started coming to the area. There was free food!And something else we used to do In Joplin we used to have a super service Sunday or a flyer Saturday where we got everybody to come together and we went out and put up NA flyers all over town Darwin R.





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By having a reliable meeting schedule addicts can depend on. Continuity is important; if an addict with cravings needs a meeting and the door is closed, there is every possibility that addict could leave, go use and die. So, being a meeting chairperson is an important responsibility. Also, letting our respective communities know where we are through public relations, and flyers with our schedule and location, and communicating with community partners that refer addicts to meetings.
